### What is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC)?

- Private, nonprofit organizations located in medically underserved areas that provide comprehensive primary care services to all individuals regardless of their ability to pay.
- FQHCs are authorized under Section 330 of the Public Health Services Act and qualify for grants from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and special reimbursement provisions in Medicare and Medicaid.



## Certification Requirements

- The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) certifies FQHCs.
- Federally qualified health centers are different than rural health clinics (RHC). A facility may not be both a RHC and FQHC.

To be designated as a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), an entity must:

- Serve a designated medicallyunderserved area or population;
- Offer a sliding fee scale to patients with income below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL);
- Provide comprehensive services;
- Have an ongoing quality assurance program;
- Meet other healthy and safety requirements; and
- Have a governing board of directors of members who receive services at the FQHC.



## **Federally Qualified Health Center Services**


FQHCs provide an array of services including:

- Medical Care
- Dental Care
- Behavioral Health Care

FQHCs also assist patients with transportation, interpretation, and other case management and care coordination services.




### Locations of Federally Qualified Health Centers in North Dakota



North Dakota has 5 Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) serving multiple locations.

- Coal Country Community Health
   Center
- Community Health Service, Inc.
- Family HealthCare
- Northland Health Centers
- Spectra Health





### Patients Served by North Dakota FQHCs

- 34,576 Total Patients
  129,542 Total Visits
  - 11,748 Total Patients
  - 24,213 Dental Visits



## How are FQHCs Paid?

- Medicare and Medicaid use a per diem encounter payment for FQHCs.
- The encounter is a single comprehensive rate for all services.
  - Each FQHC has their own individualized rate.
- Base rate is updated annually by the Medicare Economic Index (MEI).
- ND Medicaid rebased FQHC rates in the last year.

- ND Medicaid allows FQHCs to bill three types of encounters:
  - Medical
  - Behavioral Health
  - Dental
- Encounters are generated by services performed by specific providers and include all services and supplies used during the visit.
- Payment is generally limited to one medical visit, one dental visit, and one behavioral health visit a day.



## Senate Bill 2155

#### **APPROPRIATION**



\$ 2,000,000 for the 2023-2025 biennium.



DHHS shall award grants from funds appropriated to FQHCs to continue, expand, and improve FQHC services to low-income populations.


Legislative management to study the possible expansion of FQHCs.

## **Progress and Timeline for Distribution**



### 2023

- April  $\rightarrow$  Governor signed SB 2155.
- May → Meeting between CHAD and ND HHS Public Health Division to discuss the process for the funding formula.
- June → CHAD met with FQHCs to agree on a recommendation for the funding formula.
- July → CHAD provided a funding recommendation to the ND HHS Public Health Division.
- Aug → Notice of Grant Awards drafted & are with state fiscal team (6-wk timeframe).
- Sept/Oct → Anticipated distribution of 1<sup>st</sup> year funds from State.



- March → Annual services data finalized and confirmed by CHAD, shared with State.
- April → End of 1<sup>st</sup> grant period. State will write new NOAs (6-week timeframe).
- May → FQHCs will need to submit a summary of activities and expenditures through the State PRS system within 45 days after the end of the grant period.
- June → Anticipated distribution of 2ndyear funds from the State.




