 by MA Irvine, D Oller, J Boggis, B Bishop, D Coombs, E Wheeler, M Doe-Simkins, AY
 Walley, BDL Marshall, J Bratberg, TC Green, North Dakota has identified a need to
 distribute 7,810 units of naloxone
- As of 4/12/2023, **13,915** kits were distributed by BHD, LPHUs and the ONE Program.
