- 1. Describe how your entity's existing mission, policies, or commitments ensure equitable access to, and equitable participation in, the proposed project or activity.

 North Dakota policy regarding service provision ensures that families in all areas of North Dakota are provided services in their homes. Our policies state that an Early Intervention program must serve the entirety of a Human Service Region. North Dakota has always had at least one Early Intervention program serving each region, and currently half of the eight regions have more than one Early Intervention program. Our payment system is set up as a fee-for-service model, ensuring that all families are getting the services they need, and programs are receiving appropriate compensation for providing the services. North Dakota is a rural state, and all families are afforded the opportunity to receive either in-person or virtual early intervention coaching services.
- 2. Based on your proposed project or activity, what barriers may impede equitable access and participation of students, educators, or other beneficiaries?
 North Dakota views barriers as opportunities to seek improvement. One potential barrier we have identified is staff shortages in Early Intervention, particularly in the most rural areas of the state.
 Without sufficient staff in appropriate disciplines, families have the potential to see a delay in valuable and necessary services.
- 3. Based on the barriers identified, what steps will you take to address such barriers to equitable access and participation in the proposed project or activity?
 North Dakota is exploring several options to address staff shortages in Early Intervention, including retention incentives, and increased flexibility around virtual service provision.
- 4. What is your timeline, including targeted milestones, for addressing these identified barriers? North Dakota has offered a retention incentive, set to expire on June 30, 2023, to all Early Intervention providers. Currently, 3 of the 14 providers have accepted the incentive and paid it out to their staff. To continue to address this concern, North Dakota will consider options for incentivizing working for an Early Intervention provider, including online professional development opportunities that count toward licensure renewals, and participation in higher education with support from the state. North Dakota has already provided 36 individuals the opportunity to complete an Early Intervention Leadership Certificate at no cost to them through the Personnel Development Grant (325L grant). North Dakota is also exploring options for continuing the virtual service delivery options that were instituted during the Covid-19 Public Health Emergency. North Dakota anticipates that full guidance will be provided to Early

Intervention programs by the end of 2023. North Dakota recognizes that all eligible families need equitable access to services and continues to follow the intent of IDEA to assure equity is reached for all.
