A resident council is an organized, independent and self-led group of persons living in a long-term care facility.

Importance of Resident Councils

Resident Councils are important for many reasons. They have become more recognized for the important contributions that residents make when given the opportunity to speak for themselves.

They provide a forum for residents to:

- Voice their concerns directly to invited staff
- Hold the facility accountable
- Identify problems and their solutions from the residents' perspective
- Allow residents to recognize staff they feel deserving of recognition
- Open up discussion on topics of interest to residents
- Contribute to shaping their home and world.

How the Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program Can Help:

- Educate and support residents in starting a resident council
- Assist in establishing a staff contact to take resident concerns forward for resolution.
- Provide training and education on different topics.
- Assist with issue advocacy identified by the resident council.



North Dakota Law
NDCC 50-10.2-02 gives the right to residents and their families to organize, maintain, and participate in resident advisory and family councils.
