
OPTIONAL/AVAILABLE SERVICES

WHO QUALIFIES FOR THE VOUCHER PROGRAM?

Families of children ages three through 17 diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder that have a gross family income up to 200% of the Federal Poverty level, and are not receiving services through a ND Medicaid waiver, may qualify for the Autism Services Voucher Program.

WHY APPLY?

The goal of the Autism
Services Voucher
Program is to address
gaps created by an
autism diagnosis through
nontherapy-related
services and provide
support to families.

WHAT DOES THE PROGRAM DO?

The voucher program helps pay for assistive technology, training and other approved support services that enhance the quality of life of children with autism spectrum disorders and help meet the unique needs of their families.

The program provides voucher funds up to \$7,500 per year to help families with the cost of supporting a child with autism.

IMPORTANT: Early intervention and therapy services are not covered by the voucher program.
