

Fast Facts

As a result of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (P.L. 117-2) signed into law by the President on March 11, 2021, CDC is activating CDC-RFA-TP18-1802 Cooperative Agreement for Emergency Response: Public Health Crisis Response to provide additional relief to address the continued impact of COVID-19 pandemic. CDC is awarding funding to eligible jurisdictions on the approved but unfunded (ABU) list for CDC-RFA-TP18-1802 to establish, expand, and sustain a public health workforce, including school nurses. These funds are in addition to, and separate from, funds CDC previously awarded to select jurisdictions for COVID-19 response activities through CDC-RFA-TP18-1802 in the spring of 2020.

Availability of Funds

A total of \$2,000,000,000 is available to the 65 current recipients of CDC's COVID-19 Crisis Response Cooperative Agreement. A funding table is available in the guidance document. The funding formula includes base-plus-population funding. Recipients will operate under a two-year budget and performance period.



Goals of Funding

This funding is intended to establish, expand, train, and sustain the state, tribal, local, and territorial public health workforce to support jurisdictional COVID-19 prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery initiatives, including school-based health programs.
