



### Phase 1A: Health Care Workers and Long-Term Care Residents

- Health Care Worker Definition: Paid and unpaid persons serving in health care settings who have the potential for direct or indirect exposure to patients or infectious materials. This includes persons in training (i.e., nursing/medical students). Individuals who perform multiple functions should be vaccinated according to their highest priority tier.
- Long-Term Care Definition: Adults who reside in congregate facilities that provide a variety of services, including medical and personal care, to persons who are unable to live independently (i.e., skilled, basic, assisted living facilities, veterans' homes, low-income senior housing, group homes and intermediate care facilities for individuals with developmental disabilities).

The following table provides guidance to health care facilities and the North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) regarding how to prioritize limited supplies of COVID-19 vaccine amongst health care workers and long-term care residents in Phase 1A.

# Phase 1B: Older individuals, people with underlying health conditions, other congregate settings, child care workers, and employees of preschools and kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade

The following table provides guidance to health care facilities and the NDDoH regarding how to prioritize limited supplies of COVID-19 vaccine in Phase 1B.

- Phase 1A vaccination can continue once Phase 1B vaccination begins.
- Transition to Phase 1B will occur when most persons in Phase 1A have been offered vaccination and demand is declining.
- Local health care providers may transition at different times to Phase 1B.

## Phase 1B (in order of priority)

- Persons age 75 and older
- Persons age 65 74 with two or more <u>high-risk medical conditions</u>\*
- Staff and persons living in other congregate settings (i.e., corrections, group homes, treatment centers, homeless shelters, etc.)
- Persons age 65 and older with one or more <u>high-risk medical conditions</u>\*
- Persons age 65 and older with or without high-risk medical conditions\*
- Persons with two or more <u>high-risk medical conditions</u> \* regardless of age

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#### Phase 1B (in order of priority)

- Child care workers
- Workers employed by preschools or Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade:
  - Teachers, nutritional services, aides, bus drivers, principals, administrative staff, custodians, etc.

## Phase 1C: Essential workers and people of any age at increased risk for COVID-19

The following table provides guidance to health care facilities and the NDDoH regarding how to prioritize limited supplies of COVID-19 vaccine in Phase 1C.

- Phase 1B vaccination can continue once Phase 1C vaccination begins.
- Transition to Phase 1C will occur when most persons in Phase 1B have been offered vaccination and demand is declining.
- Critical Infrastructure/Essential Worker Definition: Individuals identified by the <u>Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency</u> (<u>CISA</u>) who are **unable to work from home**. The CISA advisory list identifies workers who conduct a range of operations and services that are typically essential to continued critical infrastructure viability, including staffing operations centers, maintaining and repairing critical infrastructure, operating call centers, working construction, and performing operational functions, among others. It also includes workers who support crucial supply chains and enable functions for critical infrastructure. The industries they support represent, but are not limited to, medical and healthcare, telecommunications, information technology systems, defense, food and agriculture, transportation and logistics, energy, water and wastewater, and law enforcement.

#### Phase 1C

- National Guard, not previously covered
- Workers enabling access to human food (i.e., grocery workers)
- Public safety answering points (911)
- Manufacturing related to the development or supply of COVID-19 vaccine
- Other healthcare/public health workers not included in phase 1A
- Free standing clinical laundries
- Public transit, including bus, taxi, ride-share
- Persons age 16 64 with one or more <u>high-risk medical conditions</u>\*
- Blood bank workers not previously vaccinated

The federal <u>Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP)</u> makes recommendations for which groups should be prioritized for COVID-19 vaccine. Due to limited supplies of COVID-19 vaccine, ethics, and science, the North Dakota COVID-19 Vaccination Ethics Committee made recommendations as to how to prioritize COVID-19 vaccine in North Dakota.
