Summary

The Child Care and Development Fund is a state and federal program that provides assistance to low-income families for child care services through the North Dakota Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP). States also use the fund to enhance child care programs and help connect parents with appropriate child care providers. As part of the conditions for federal funding, state agencies that administer the program must submit a comprehensive State Plan every three years. As part of that plan agencies must submit a market rate survey and a cost analysis. Findings from the market rate survey are used to set child care subsidies and ensure that reimbursements are adequate to ensure equitable choice and access to child care for recipient households. Findings from the cost analysis are used to inform states' determination of payment rates. The cost analysis enables the examination of the gap between the actual cost of services and market rates when setting reimbursement rates. The objective of this study is to conduct a market rate study and a narrow cost analysis of licensed child care providers in North Dakota.

At the time the survey was initiated, there were 1,172 licensed child care providers in the state of North Dakota. During the survey fielding period, 26 either closed or were closing and an additional five providers responded who were not in the original sample. In total, 753 providers responded to the survey for an adjusted response rate of 66%. Sixty-five percent of responding providers were located in urban counties, which is similar to the percentage of all providers located in urban counties. Just over one-quarter (27%) of responding providers carried Center license types (C, E, K, or M), compared to 73% with Family/Group license types (F, G, or H)¹. Distribution of responding providers is similar to the distribution of all providers; 74% of providers in the state have Family license types and the remaining 26% carried Center license types.

More than half of responding providers (61%) were licensed for a capacity of 20 or fewer children (median capacity of 17), and just over half (54%) of providers indicated no vacancies at the time of the survey. Nearly all respondents (94%) provided care for preschool children (ages 3 to 5), 88% provided care for toddlers (18 to 35 months), and 83% provided infant care (0 to 17 months). Seventy-four percent of providers served school-age children (6 to 12 years). Nearly two-thirds of providers (64%) served all four age groups; just ten percent served only one age group.

Average enrollment of children increased by age group. An average of four infants were enrolled full time per provider as compared to an average of ten school-age children enrolled per full-time per provider. Wait lists had the inverse trend; providers with wait lists indicated an average of six infants waiting for full-time care, while the average wait list for full-time care for school-age children was one.

More than half (56%) of providers offered full- and part-time care, and nearly all responding providers (92%) were open year-round. Eighty-two percent offered after-school care, while slightly fewer (63%) offered before-school care. Family child care providers were more likely to offer weekend, evening, or overnight care than other provider types, and rural providers were more likely than urban providers to offer other care options such as drop-in care. Approximately two-thirds of providers (66%) open between 7am and 8am, and 68% close between 5pm and 6pm.

Weekly normalized rates were lower for older children. The average full-time rate was \$199.36 per week for infant care, \$192.85 for toddlers, \$183.10 for preschoolers, and \$162.26 for school-age children. Part-time rates were somewhat lower. The average part-time weekly rate was \$167.43 for infants, \$160.98 for toddlers, \$160.89 for preschoolers, and \$131.06 for school-age children. Seventy percent of responding providers indicated charging for extra services such as late pick-up or meals and snacks, while 40% of responding providers charged a registration

¹ Family license types operate in a provider's home, with the exception of a group facility which is located in non-residential building license and permits larger capacities. The provider's own children are required as being among those in attendance for both family and group facility) Center license types are those situated in an external facility, not a home, and are generally licensed for larger numbers of children; the minimum capacity for a Center license is 19. Out of those who responded, Family providers were licensed for an average of 17 children, while Center providers were licensed for an average of 88 children.

fee not covered in basic tuition. The average registration fee in 2023 was a one-time payment of \$121.91. Sixty-seven percent of responding providers also charged extra fees for late payments or deposits.

Nearly two-thirds (65%) of providers had on average five children enrolled from families that receive CCAP benefits. Fifty-four percent of providers with children enrolled in CCAP reported that reimbursement rates fully covered the cost of care. For those who reported that the CCAP rate did not cover the full cost of care, 80% indicated that the family paid the full difference, while just eight percent said the family paid none of the difference. When providers were asked about specific issues that might be barriers to accepting children who receive CCAP, over half of responding providers indicated either the specific issue was not a barrier, or they did not know. However, among providers who expressed concern about the specific issues as barriers, low payment reimbursement was the greatest barrier to accepting children on subsidies; 41% of responding providers indicated low payment rates were at least somewhat of a barrier.

Just over one-third (38%) of providers who responded to the survey participated in Bright & Early ND, the state's Quality Rating & Improvement System (QRIS). Of those, just over half (52%) were in Step 1, while another 30% were in Step 2 of the system. Most providers (92%) did not increase their rates when they became certified or advanced their QRIS ratings (89%).

Seventy-one percent of responding providers participated in the USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program in 2023. Eighty-seven percent of responding providers indicated their program accepts children with special needs, while 42% had children with special needs enrolled at the time of survey. More than two-thirds (69%) of staff members or owners had experience or training with attention deficit disorders, and 64% had experience or training with emotional or behavioral needs. While just over one-third (36%) of responding providers had wheelchair-accessible facilities, wheelchair accessibility varied greatly by facility type; only seven percent of homebased providers were wheelchair accessible compared to 69% of non-homebased providers.

Nearly all (95%) respondents employed full-time staff, while just under half (44%) employed part-time staff. Among those employing full-time staff, 15% indicated they were the sole staffer or owner of the facility, 61% employed full-time teachers, and 34% employed full-time administrative staff. Sixty percent of responding providers employed part-time classroom assistants and 34% employed part-time teachers. One-third (33%) of responding providers offered fringe benefits to their full-time employees; 93% of these providers offered paid time off, 60% offered health insurance, and 49% offered retirement benefits. Far fewer responding providers (17%) offered fringe benefits to their part-time employees; of those providers who offered benefits to part-time employees, 71% offered paid time off and 38% offered retirement benefits. Just 15% of responding providers offered health insurance to their part-time employees.

Average wages for staff ranged from \$13.44 per hour for part-time staff to \$19.79 per hour for full-time administrative staff. Administrative staff had the highest average hourly wages for full-time and part-time positions (\$19.49 and \$15.89, respectively). Average hourly wage for full-time teachers was \$16.81 per hour and the average wage for part-time teachers was \$14.94 per hour.

Two-thirds (68%) of responding providers owned their facility space, while another 20% rented their space. Just over half (55%) of responding providers operated out of their homes. The average square footage of a homebased facility in 2023 was 3,075 square feet, with approximately 1,196 square feet used exclusively for child care. Homebased child care facilities provided care for an average of 50 hours per week, with an additional 18 hours of program management outside of care hours.

Average differences between enrollment revenue and expenditure costs for responding providers varied widely in 2022, ranging from a net negative of -\$1,264,213 to a net positive of \$1,214,777. Difference varied considerably based on license type, Bright & Early ND participation, and homebased status. Some facilities appeared to have a positive difference between enrollment revenue and expenditure costs; however, when this difference was examined on a per-child basis, there was in fact a net negative difference. This discrepancy was due to a number of

factors, primarily the variation in cost for providing care to children of different age groups and different enrollment status (full-time versus part-time). In general, facilities with Family license types (F, G, and H), those who were Bright & Early ND certified, and those who operated out of their homes operated at a *per-child* net negative difference between enrollment revenue and expenditure costs, even if their facilities appeared to generate a net positive difference overall, on average.

The Center for Social Research (CSR) at NDSU was contracted by the North Dakota Department of Health and Human Services Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) team in spring 2023 to conduct its annual market rate survey and narrow cost analysis to determine reimbursement rates for participants in the Child Care Assistance Program. This rate determination process is overseen by the federal government and administered by the state, using data gathered from child care providers to calculate the best-fitting reimbursements for parents who require assistance to afford child care.

The Child Care Assistance Program provides reimbursement to eligible families for the cost of child care. Eligibility criteria include: employment or enrollment in an education program; temporary allowable activity (in situations of homelessness); age limits; and asset (including income) limits. If a family meets the eligibility criteria, payments are made to the provider. Rate reimbursements are determined by license type and age of child. Center license types (C, E, K, and M) are aggregated to estimate rates and costs for Center providers. Family and Group License types (F, G, and H) are aggregated to estimate rates and costs for "Family/Group" providers.

The state government supports professional development of child care providers through the Bright & Early North Dakota program, the state's Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS). This program provides technical assistance, specialized training, and access to financial incentives for providers who become certified. See the Appendix for more information on Bright & Early ND.

The survey was composed of two parts: a market rate survey that gathered information about current 2023 provider characteristics, child care rates, and staffing; and a narrow cost analysis for the previous year of 2022, which solicited information about the annual expenses and costs of running a child care program.

Methodology

Survey and fielding

The Center for Social Research team developed a survey instrument to collect data on market rates and costs associated with child care operations (Appendix B: Survey Instrument). The portion of the questionnaire related to market rates was modeled after the questionnaire used in the previous assessment and with input from the CCAP and Child Care Aware of ND teams. The portion of the questionnaire related to the narrow cost analysis was developed after a review of other states' questionnaires and with feedback from both the CCAP and Child Care Aware teams to refine and tailor question response options.

In September of 2023, a list of child care providers was pulled from the ND Child Care Licensing database resulting in a list of 1,199 licensed child care providers in North Dakota. This file was cleaned and providers with no addresses, inactive licenses, self-declared providers and tribal code R licenses were deleted from the list leaving 1,172 active licensed providers. Self-declared and tribal licenses are excluded from the survey². Over the course of the study, 26 providers closed or became inactive and were removed from the contact list.

The survey was launched online on October 23, 2023, using Qualtrics online survey software, with personalized links for each provider, enabling response tracking. To encourage participation, a rigorous campaign of email reminders, social media posts, and telephone outreach was conducted. In addition, Child Care Aware staff contacted providers who had not responded after multiple reminders by telephone to encourage participation. Finally, a paper survey was mailed to providers who had not yet responded on January 8, 2024. The mailing also contained a letter with a QR code for online completion. The survey was closed January 22, 2024 after 90 days of fielding.

Without accounting for providers who closed or opened after the initial list of licensed child care providers were pulled for contact, the survey achieved a 64.2% response rate. Accounting for the 26 providers that closed while the survey was in the field, the survey achieved a response rate of 65.7%.

Analysis

Data sets were downloaded from Qualtrics in five separate files. First, the individualized survey (completed responses and partial responses) and the anonymous/QR code survey (completed responses and partial responses)

² Self-declared providers are not considered part of the priced child care provider market as they do not constitute arm's length transactions. Tribal licenses are administered by each tribe separately from the state licensing body and their funding is managed by the federal government, and so outside the remit of this research.

were downloaded. Paper surveys were input into a separate version of the online survey and downloaded, and all five files were merged in Microsoft Excel. Duplicate responses, all partial responses under 40% complete, and any anonymous response that could not be confirmed from an existing provider were not included in the analysis.

Data were then downloaded from Qualtrics in SPSS format and loaded into SPSS 28, merged, and matched with the final Excel file to produce a dataset of 753 responses. The remainder of the analysis was conducted using SPSS 28 and Stata 17.

Survey respondents were given the option of providing rates using various rate schedules: hourly, daily, weekly, and monthly. The rates were normalized to a weekly rate. Calculations were as follows:

- Hourly: hourly rates were multiplied by average hours open per day, then by days open per week
- Daily: daily rates were multiplied by days open per week
- Weekly: no calculation was needed for weekly rates
- Monthly: monthly rates were divided by four

If providers did not respond to questions about their operating hours, the mean hours of operations from other providers was used for the calculation. On average, providers operated 10 hours per day and were open five days per week.

To estimate annual revenue from student enrollment, weekly rates for each student age group and part/full-time status were multiplied by enrollment and multiplied by 52.

Crosstabulations were performed with significance testing using pairwise comparison, with significance level 0.05. The following demographic groups were used for analysis:

- License type (Center; Family; Group-family; Group-facility; Preschool; School-Age; Multiple Licenses)
- License group (Center; Family)
- Regionality (Urban; Rural)
- Age group (Infants, Toddlers, Preschool, School-Age)
- Capacity (Fewer than 10; 10 to 12; 13 to 20; 21 to 30; More than 30)
- Vacancies (No vacancies; One or more vacancies)
- Homebased provider (Yes; No)³
- Bright & Early certified (Yes; No)⁴

Statistics offered in the report body are: mean, median, and 75th percentile. Mean refers to the average, where all responses are summed, and divided by the count of providers who responded to that question. Median refers to the 50th percentile, where half of the responding providers are below that point, and half are above. Seventy-fifth percentile refers to the point at which 75% of providers are below, and 25% of providers are above. Please note that in some tables, "percentile" is abbreviated to "ptile" for space considerations. See the example below for each measure.

Here, the mean (or average) capacity of a child care facility is 36 children. Median enrollment of 17 indicates that 50 % of respondents are licensed for 17 or fewer children, and 50% are licensed for more than 17 children. The 75th percentile enrollment of 30 indicates that 75% of respondents are licensed for 30 or fewer children, and 25% are licensed for more than 30 children.

Narrow cost analysis details

The narrow cost analysis was conducted using data collected from questions that inquired about operating expenditures in 2022. The survey also collected data on enrollment, type of provider, full and part-time market rates, and participation in the state's Bright & Early ND program. Estimates of annual overall and per-student enrollment revenues, expenditures, and the differences between the two were derived from these data. Data were excluded from the analysis if respondents failed or refused to respond, responses were clearly erroneous, or if total net difference was more than two standard deviations above or below the mean. The total number of useable surveys was 201.

Comparisons of mean expenditures were completed using two sample t-tests. Where variance could not be assumed to be equal, Welch's two sample t-tests were used. Otherwise, Student's two sample t-tests were used.

Results

Provider demographics

Similar to the actual distribution of child care providers in North Dakota, most providers who responded to the survey were from urban areas as compared to rural⁵ areas – a split of 65% to 35%, respectively (Figure 1). Specifically, 489 respondents were from urban counties while 264 were from rural counties. Fifty-six percent of respondents were located in the four most populous counties of Cass, Burleigh, Grand Forks, and Ward.




Figure 2: Survey Respondents by Child Care Provider License Type, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

There are seven license types with distinct specifications. The most common type of license designation among survey respondents was group home child care (42%), followed by family child care (16%) and group facility child care (15%) (Figure 2).

A provider may also carry multiple licenses. The most common license type among respondents with multiple license types was a preschool license (94%) and a center child care (69%) (Figure 3).

In rural areas, group home child care was the most common license type, while center and family child care were more prevalent in urban settings, as was care for school-age children alone (Table 3).


Figure 4: Survey Responses by Organizational Structure, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

Half of providers (51%) operated as a sole proprietor or partnership, while 23% operated as a non-profit organization. Nineteen percent operated as an LLC (limited liability company), and four percent operated as a corporation (Figure 4).

Most providers reported owning the facility in which they operated their business (68%); 26% indicated they rent or lease their child care facility (Figure 5).

Ninety-one percent of homebased providers reported owning their facility (compared to 41% of non-homebased providers), with an additional eight percent who rent; the remainder lease or have another arrangement (Table 4).

More than three-quarters (77%) of providers carried business liability insurance. However, the prevalence of business liability insurance varied by licensed capacity (Figure 6). Larger capacity facilities were significantly more likely to carry business liability insurance than smaller facilities, as were non-homebased providers and QRIScertified providers.

Ninety-one percent of providers with capacity of 21 to 30 children or more carry business liability insurance compared to 55% of providers with licensed capacity of 10 or fewer children. Homebased providers were less likely



to carry liability insurance than non-homebased providers: 62% of homebased providers carry liability insurance compared to 94% of non-homebased providers (Table 5).


Figure 7: Survey Responses by Providers Using Child Management Software, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023


Figure 8: Survey Responses by Additional Languages for Business Materials, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

All providers provided instruction and business materials in English. Eight percent of responding providers also provided American Sign Language (ASL) in classroom instruction, and four percent provide instruction in Spanish. Ten percent of providers provided business materials in another language, with the most common second language being Spanish. Additionally, some providers stated they would translate "as needed" into whatever language was required (Figure 8).

Nearly all providers (94%) indicated providing care for preschoolers (age 3 to 5). Eighty-eight percent provide care for toddlers (18 to 35 months), and 83% provide care for infants (birth to 17 months). Just under three-quarters (74%) of providers provide care for school-age children (age 6 to 12) (Figure 9).

Figure 9: Survey Responses by Care Provided by Age Group, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023



Homebased providers were significantly more likely to provide care for children aged 5 years or younger, while providers who were licensed for more than 30 children were more likely to provide care for preschool and schoolage children.

More than half (61%) of providers have no pet sharing the space with the children in their care. Thirty percent of providers have a dog sharing the space with children in their care, while 15% have a cat. Four percent have another type of animal, which included rabbits, fish, and lizards (Figure 10). More than 90% of non-homebased providers do not have pets sharing space with children, while 38% of homebased providers say they have no indoor pets at their facility (data not shown). Additionally, rural providers were more likely than urban providers to say they have no indoor pets at their facility (71% and 56%, respectively) (data not shown; see Appendix F: Tables – Findings by Regionality).

Eighty percent of facilities have fenced-in outdoor play areas, with little variance among license types or location of the child care facility.

Capacity and Vacancies

Statewide, on average, providers were licensed for 36 children, though the most frequent licensed capacity was 17. Licensed capacity was similar to desired capacity, suggesting that providers were generally licensed at their desired capacity. Urban providers were more likely than rural providers to have licensed capacity at or above 30 children, while homebased providers were more likely to be licensed for smaller capacities – a mean capacity of 16 children for homebased providers as compared to mean capacity of 61 children for non-homebased providers. When asked about vacancies, 54% of providers responded they had no vacancies (Figure 11).

When capacity and vacancies were examined by number of children, most providers' enrollments were close to their licensed capacity. On average, providers reported only a handful of vacancies in each capacity grouping. Larger providers reported more vacancies on average, however the largest child care provider facilities were more likely to be found in urban centers and may not be available to all families in the state (Appendix D: Descriptive Frequencies).

Providers licensed as group home child care or school-age child care were more likely to have no vacancies; 65% and 82%, respectively, reported no vacancies. Sixty-nine percent of those who have a licensed capacity of 10 to 12 children reported zero vacancies, as did 63% of those who have a licensed capacity of 13 to 20 children. Sixty-one percent of homebased providers reported zero vacancies, as compared to 46% of non-homebased providers (Table 8).



Over half of providers (56%) offered both full and part-time care, while 43% provided only full-time care. Less than two percent of providers provided only part-time care (Figure 12). Among providers who offered full-time care, nearly all had at least one child in their care full-time. However, only half of providers had at least one child in their care part-time. Providers offering full-time care had the most children at preschool-age (an average of 10 children), while those providing part-time care had the most children at school age (an average of four children).

Homebased providers were more likely to limit care to full-time care only; 50% of homebased providers offered full-time care only compared to 34% of non-homebased providers. Alternately, non-homebased providers more frequently offered both full and part time care than home-based providers, 64% compared to 50%, respectively (Figure 13).

Not all providers indicated having children on a wait list for either full or part-time care. However, more than half of providers (58%) had at least one child on their wait list. Wait lists for part-time care were far less prevalent; only 16% of providers had at least one child on a part-time wait list (Table 9).



Schedules


Figure 15: Survey Respondents by Additional Schedule Options, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

In addition to full-time care hours, 82% of providers offered after-school care, while 68% provided drop-in care and 63% provided before-school care. More than one-third (36%) provided temporary or emergency care, while just 10% of providers offered evening care. Less than ten percent of providers offered weekend care (8%), overnight care (8%), or another type of care (4%) (Figure 15).

Homebased providers were more likely to offer drop-in and emergency care than non-homebased providers, which were more likely to offer before and after school care (Figure 15).

Figure 16: Survey Respondents by Schedule Options by Homebased Status, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023




Figure 17: Survey Respondents by Yearly Care Schedule, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

Nearly all providers (92%) offered year-round care, with just seven percent offering school year only care (Figure 17). Of those providers who only offered care during the school year, 85% were preschool only providers (data not shown).

Most facilities (95%) only had one opening and one closing time, though five percent of providers reported at least two opening and closing times throughout the day. Most providers opened between 7:00 am and 7:59 am (66%), while 25% opened between 6:00 am and 6:59 am. Most providers closed at or near the end of the business day: 68% closed between 5:00 pm and 5:59 pm and 17% closed between 4:00 pm and 4:59 pm. Only nine percent of providers remained open during the hour of 6:00 pm (Figure 18). Very few providers were open on the weekends (5%), but those who were followed a similar schedule (data not shown).

Rates

Please note, regarding rates for school-age children: many providers offer specifically tailored rate schedules or slots for school-age children; this is due to the unique nature of being a secondary care provider (the primary often being some type of schooling during the day). While most providers gave standardized rates, some had rate options such as: an hourly rate for days where the child has school, and a daily rate for no-school days (such as holidays). These types of situation rates are difficult to include in the normalization process.

Provider data for service rates was provided according to provider fee schedules. Some providers charge per month, while other charge per week or bi-monthly. In some cases, providers charged per hour; this was most common for part-time care. The rates provided below use data from those providers who offered standardized rates, and were calculated based on specific assumptions about care rates and schedules. Part-time rates were calculated using a maximum care

provision of 25 hours a week, as this was the average response from providers when asked, "How many hours per week does a child have to be in your care to be considered "full-time" as opposed to "part-time?".

Many providers offer tailored rate schedules for school-age children; while most providers gave standardized rates, some reported various rate schedules such as an hourly rate for days where the child has school, and a daily rate for no-school days (such as holidays).

Full-time rates

Nearly half (46%) of providers offered full-time care based on weekly rates, though 14% offered monthly rates instead. Other providers offered care rates at daily, bi-monthly, or annual rates. The average normalized weekly infant rate was \$199 per week, while the average normalized school-age child rate was \$162 per week (Table 10).

Preschool-only providers had significantly lower average rates than other license types for full-time care (\$71.96 per week on average). However, due to low response rates, there is a high degree in variability for preschool-only provider rates. Other provider types' rates ranged from \$175 to \$213 per week for preschool care. The same was true for school-age-only providers who averaged \$96.57 a week for full-time care, as compared to providers with multiple license types, who averaged \$159.83 a week for school age children (Table 11).

Urban providers had significantly higher average rates for infants, toddlers, and preschool children than rural providers; the greatest cost difference was in full-time infant rates, which differed by \$28.34. Providers with greater total licensed capacity also had the highest rates across children aged under 6 years old (Table 12). Providers licensed for fewer than 10 children also had significantly higher average full-time rates for toddler care (\$192.91) than those licensed for between 10 and 30 children. Full-time rates for school-aged children were the most similar across capacity and regionality.

Providers who reported zero vacancies had significantly lower rates for infants, toddlers, and preschool children as well, and though home-based providers had significantly lower rates for infants and toddlers than non-homebased providers, there was no significant difference in rates for older children (Table 13). Providers who were Bright & Early ND certified also had significantly higher full-time rates for infants, toddlers, and preschool children, with the greatest difference being in rates for full-time toddler care – an average of \$15.33.

Part-time rates

In the table below, rates are normalized to a weekly schedule for direct comparability. However, providers charge at a variety of schedules, with one-quarter charging per day for part-time care.

Part-time rates across all provider types range from \$131 to \$167 per week for infants. Average weekly part-time rates were essentially the same for toddlers and pre-school, with averages varying by only a few cents (Table 14).

Part-time weekly rates varied widely depending on the age of the child and the license type. The lowest weekly part-time rates were for preschool children at preschool only facilities, \$65 per week, while the highest rates were for infant care at center child care facilities, \$197 per week. Rates varied far less within age categories and by license type, excepts for preschool only programs. Preschool-only rates were far less than other license types.

Preschool care within other license types ranged from \$148 per week to \$171 per week. Rates for infants ranged from \$158 to \$197 per week, toddlers ranged from \$150 to \$182 per week, and school age ranged from \$102 to \$132 per week (Table 15).

For infants, toddlers, and preschoolers, urban providers charged more on average for part-time care than rural providers. The greatest differences between average rates were for infants and toddlers. Urban providers charged on average \$181.25 per week for part-time infant care, while rural providers charged \$154.58 per week. The difference in rates for toddlers was similar to the difference for infants; urban providers charged \$36 and \$31 per week more than rural providers respectively. The difference in rates between urban and rural providers was less for preschool and school age children. Urban providers charged \$18 and \$11 more per week for preschool and school age children, respectively (Table 16).

Providers who participated in Bright & Early charged higher average part-time care rates for all age groups (Table 17) compared to providers who were not QRIS-certified; Bright & Early-certified providers charged nearly \$30 more on average for part-time infant care per week. There was no significant difference among providers with or without vacancies, but homebased providers charged significantly more for part-time school-aged child care than non-homebased providers (\$140.44 and \$122.10, respectively). Homebased provider status was not a driver of any other significant differences in rates, however; rates for other age groups differed by less than \$7 between homebased and non-homebased providers.



Additional services and fees

In addition to charges for care, some providers charge for additional services, such as late pick-up or meals and snacks, or charge fees for registration or late pickup or payment fees.

Seventy percent of providers charged for additional services such as late pick up, transportation, or meals (Figure 19). Providers most frequently charged for late pick up or early drop-off: 56% and 20%, respectively. Providers who charged for late pick-up most commonly charged per minute (77%), and this charge was, on average, a dollar a minute (Figure 18).

Thirty-nine percent of providers charge a registration fee that is not included as part of basic tuition; this fee is typically charged one time, and averaged around \$120. Some providers charge an annual fee, though this is typically less (on average, \$59).

Non-homebased providers were significantly more likely to charge registration fees than homebased providers. More than half of non-homebased providers (55%) charged for registration compared to 25% percent of homebased providers. As well, providers who reported one or more vacancies were more likely to charge for registration: 46% as compared to 33% of providers with zero reported vacancies. Urban providers also more frequently charged a registration fee than rural providers. Nearly half (47%) of urban providers charged for registration, as compared to 27% of rural providers. Providers licensed for more than 30 children were also significantly more likely to charge a registration fee (78%), compared to providers who were licensed for smaller capacities (18% to 33%, depending on capacity grouping (Table 19).



More than two-thirds of providers (67%) charged at least one additional fee not included with basic tuition (Figure 21). Nearly half of providers (47%) charged for late payment – commonly \$10 a day per day late – while one-quarter charged holding fees, and another one-quarter charged a deposit. Holding fees ranged from weekly to one-time, though the average weekly holding fee was just over \$110, and the average one-time holding fee was more than \$350. Deposits were most commonly one-time payments of \$250 (Table 20).

Figure 21: Extra Fees Not Included in Basic Tuition, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023





One-tenth (11%) of providers did not charge for absences. More than three-quarters (79%) of providers charge when a child is absent due to other reasons in their family, while 76% charge when a child is absent due to family vacation. Nearly two-thirds (60%) require parents to pay before providing care (Figure 22).

Figure 22: Program Charging Practices, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023




Most child care providers had at least one child from a family that receives CCAP benefits. Sixty five percent of providers have one or more children enrolled in CCAP (Figure 23). Thirty-eight percent of providers who had at least one child currently receiving CCAP benefits responded that they had six or more children in the assistance program, while slightly less (34%) had only one or two children (Figure 24).

Seventy-five percent of Bright & Early certified providers had children currently receiving CCAP benefits, compared to 57% of non-certified providers. Half of homebased providers (49%) had children receiving CCAP benefits, while 82% of non-homebased providers had children currently receiving CCAP benefits. Additionally, nearly three-quarters (73%) of providers with at least one vacancy had children currently receiving CCAP, compared to 57% of providers with zero reported vacancies. Providers with larger capacity (those with group facility or center license types, or those certified for over 20 children) were more likely to have children currently receiving CCAP benefits (Table 21).



Almost two-thirds of providers (62%) received CCAP benefits in 2022; the median benefit amount for this year was \$14,000, though there was a wide range of benefit revenue.


Figure 25: Survey Responses by 2022 CCAP Enrollment and Benefits, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

Just over half of providers (54%) who received CCAP benefits in 2022 reported that reimbursement rates covered the cost of providing care. For providers that indicated the reimbursement was not enough to cover the cost of care, 80% indicated the family paid the full cost of the difference between cost of care and reimbursement rates. Only eight percent of providers indicated the family pays none of the difference when CCAP reimbursement does not cover the full rate of care (Figure 26).

Urban providers were more likely than rural providers to indicate the CCAP reimbursement did not cover the full rate of providing care (Figure 27). Fifty-five percent of urban providers indicated the CCAP benefits did not cover the rate of providing care, compared to only 30 percent of rural providers. When CCAP reimbursement did not


cover the cost of care, rural providers were more likely to say that the family paid none of the difference in rates (15% compared to 5% of urban providers; Figure 28).



Providers were asked to rate to what degree various considerations were barriers to accepting children of families who receive CCAP benefits. The two most common barriers to accepting children of families who receive CCAP benefits were low reimbursement rates and additional administrative duties (41% each). One-third of providers indicated that it takes too long to receive payments (33%) and 29% have full enrollment without children who qualify (Figure 29: Issues Acting as Barriers to Accepting Children Enrolled in CCAP, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023).

When asked to list additional barriers to accepting children of parents who receive CCAP benefits, issues related to communication—either with CCAP or with parents—were most frequently cited as an extreme barrier⁶. Specific issues cited were:

- Communication difficulties, both with the state and with families
- Complicated or changing system
- Co-payments were too high
 - o Parents could not afford the difference they were asked to cover
 - The wait in approval caused a delay in payment coverage, which parents could not cover
- Excessive paperwork
 - Paper mail was overwhelming to manage for families and providers
- Extended approval times
 - Using a "snail mail" system caused troublesome delays for providers and families for initial approval, adding children, or renewals

Nearly three-quarters (71%) of providers participate in the USDA Child and Adult Care Food Program.

Homebased providers were more likely to participate in the USDA food program than non-homebased providers (80% compared to 60%, respectively), as well as those who were QRIS-certified; 78% of those who participated in Bright & Early also participated in the USDA food program, compared to 66% of those who were not QRIS-certified (Table 22).



When asked about participation in the state's Quality Rating & Improvement System (QRIS), Bright & Early ND, 38% of providers indicated they were a part of the system (Figure 31). Of those providers who participated in the program, 52% were Step 1 rating; 30% were Step 2, 11% were Step 3, and seven percent were Step 4⁷.



Of those homebased providers who were certified, 62% were rated Step 1 compared to 43% of non-homebased providers; non-homebased providers were more likely to be rated Step 2 or 3.

Nearly all participating providers did not increase their rates when they became quality rated or when their quality rating increased (92% and 89%, respectively).

Figure 32: Tuition Increases Due to Quality Rating Changes, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023




Figure 33: Survey Responses by Special Needs Availability and Enrollment, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023

Most providers indicated their program accepts children with special needs (87%). Approximately four in ten providers (42%) indicated having children with special needs currently in their care (Figure 33).

When asked about training or experience in special needs areas, more than two-thirds (69%) of providers indicated they or their staff had training or experience with ADD or ADHD. Sixty-four percent of providers or their staff had experience or training with emotional or behavioral needs, and 57% of providers or staff had experience or training with developmental delays. Just over half of providers (53%) indicated that they or their staff had experience or training with autism, while just under half (49%) had experience or training with asthma. Only two percent of providers responded that they or their staff had experience or training with HIV or Hepatitis B (Figure 34).

Facilities licensed for larger capacities – those more likely to be non-homebased – were significantly more likely to be wheelchair accessible (Table 24). Sixty-nine percent of non-homebased facilities are wheelchair-accessible compared to seven percent of homebased providers. Larger providers are also more likely to be wheel chair accessible; 87% of providers with a licensed capacity greater than 30 were wheelchair-accessible, compared to 53% of those with capacity of 21 to 30. Providers with less capacity were even less likely to have wheelchair-accessible facilities – only five percent of providers with capacity under 10 had wheelchair accessibility.

Sixty-one percent of reported full-time staff was teachers, while 36% of full-time staff was classroom assistants. However, classroom assistants made up 60% of reported part-time staff. 

Fringe benefits

About one-third (33%) of respondents offered fringe benefits to staff members (Figure 42). The most common fringe benefit was paid time off; 93% of employers offered their staff paid time off. Health insurance was the second most frequently reported fringe benefit (60%). Only 17% of employers offered fringe benefits to their part-time employees. Of those providers who offered fringe benefits to part-time staff, paid time off was the most frequently reported fringe benefit; 71% of employers indicated they offered paid time off to part-time staff (Figure 42).

Figure 42: Fringe Benefits for Full- or Part-time Staff, Annual Market Rate and Narrow Cost Analysis Survey, 2023



Narrow Cost Analysis

The difference between enrollment revenue and total expenditures varied substantially, ranging from a net negative of -\$1,264,213 to a net positive of \$1,214,777. The average difference between enrollment revenue and total expenditures was \$47,392, median was \$37,090, and the 75th percentile was \$102,632 (Table 34). Revenues, expenditures, and the difference between the two varied considerably across license type, and between homebased versus non-homebased facility.

The difference between enrollment revenue and expenditures was greater for providers with Center license types (C, E, K, and M) than providers with Family license types (F, G, and H), \$78,208 compared to \$18,671, respectively. Facilities carrying Center license types were also larger, with an average of 65 children compared to 16 children at Family-licensed facilities (Table 35).

Providers who participated in Bright & Early ND had fewer enrolled children than providers who did not participate in Bright & Early ND, with an average of 35 children compared to 44 children respectively. Annual enrollment revenue and expenditures were slightly lower for providers who participated in Bright & Early ND, with no statistically significant differences between either average annual enrollment revenues or average annual expenditures. The difference between enrollment revenues and expenditures was also very similar, with no statistical difference between providers who participated in Bright & Early ND and those who did not, \$43,268 and \$51,981, respectively.

Homebased facilities operate out of a private residence, while non-homebased facilities operate out of other types of commercial or other space that is not a private residence. Non-homebased facilities had significantly higher average annual enrollment revenues and significantly higher average annual expenditures than homebased facilities. Accordingly, the difference between enrollment revenues and expenditures was also significantly different: \$6,098 for home-based providers compared to \$68,636 for non-homebased providers. This difference is likely due to the fact that providers with non-homebased licenses were much larger than home/family providers. Average enrollment for non-homebased providers was 54 compared to 13 children at homebased facilities.

When revenues and costs were examined on a per facility basis by the various child care facility types (homebased and non-homebased, Bright & Early ND, Center or Family), on average none operated at a loss. However, when cost and revenues were examined on a *per-child* basis, costs exceeded revenues for some providers. This discrepancy is likely due to varying cost of providing care to children of different age groups and giving equal weight in enrollment counts to full-time and part-time students. Accordingly, a facility operating at a per-child loss may still be operating at an overall profit. Center facilities with license types C, E, K, and M, non-participants in Bright & Early ND, and non-homebased facilities enrollment revenues were greater than expenditures on a per facility basis. Family facilities with license types F, G, and H, Bright & Early participants, and homebased facilities enrollment revenues were slightly less than expenditures. However, the differences between enrollment revenue and expenditures by license group, by Bright & Early certified, and by homebased provider status were small and not significantly different. This suggests that when evaluating on a per child basis, there is little difference between the various types of providers (Table 36).

2022 Expenditures

Expenditures were separated into five categories: personnel; supplies; use; other operating expenditures; and capital expenditures. Personnel expenditures were calculated by summing salary expenditures and personnel benefits expenditures. Supply expenditures were calculated by summing kitchen, education, cleaning, and office supply expenditures. Use expenditures were calculated by summing use expenditures (rent, mortgage, etc.) and utilities expenditures. Other operating expenditures were calculated by summing all other operational expenditures, which include non-personnel insurance, software, licensure and membership dues, training, maintenance costs, enrichment activities, transportation costs, advertisement, and interest payments. Capital expenditures were calculated by summing all capital expenditures, which included playground equipment, fencing, large appliances, furniture, and vehicles.

Expenditures for personnel were the largest expenditure category. Personnel expenditures were on average about \$236,000 per year. Supplies and use expenditures were a distant second, with average provider expenditures of about \$37,500 and \$29,500 respectively (Table 37).

Average personnel expenditures, use expenditures, and other operation expenditures were significantly higher for facilities with Center license types C, E, K, and M than for facilities with Family license types F, G, and H. Personnel expenditures for Center license types were roughly 8 times as great as personnel expenditures for Family license types, approximately \$432,000 compared to approximately \$53,000, respectively. It is reasonable to expect expenditures to be higher for Center licensed providers compared to Family licensed providers given the substantial difference in the average number of children enrolled. Average capital expenditures were higher for Family license types than Center license types; approximately \$20,700 compared to approximately \$15,000 respectively, thought the differences were not statistically significant. Capital expenditures are one-time expenditures that can vary substantially from year to year (Table 38).

While expenditures for Bright & Early ND certified providers was slightly less than those providers that were not Bright & Early ND certified, the differences were not statistically significant except for use expenditures and capital expenditures. Use expenditures were significantly higher for providers who were not certified in Bright & Early ND than for those who were Bright & Early ND certified. Capital expenditures were significantly higher for Bright & Early certified than non-Bright & Early certified, \$27,507 compared to \$9,985, respectively. It should be noted, however, that due to the relatively low response rate to the revenues and expenditures sections of the survey compared to the rest of the survey, some caution should be taken when considering the significance of differences between expenditures and revenues across groups (Table 39).

Average personnel expenditures, use expenditures, and other operation expenditures were substantially larger and significantly higher for non-homebased providers than they were for homebased providers. Given the large difference in enrollment between non-homebased and homebased providers, the difference is not unexpected. Expenditures for personnel were 10 times higher for non-homebased providers than for homebased providers. The differences in means between these groups for supply expenditures and capital expenditures were not statistically significant (Table 40).

Next Steps and Recommendations

Considerations for future analysis and research

This study represents a first effort to better understand differences in rates, expenses, and characteristics of the state child care providers. Federal guidelines set a target response rate of 65%. Achieving the target response rate of 65% took a considerable effort. In order to facilitate a more robust response, further coordination with the licensing agencies is recommended. In addition to online communication, mail correspondence and the addition of a paper mail survey is recommended. A mixed methods approach incorporating mail earlier in the data collection phase should improve response rates.

Lessons learned from the way providers interpreted and answered survey questions provided considerable insight into how future questionnaires can be modified to improve data collection. The survey instrument should be revised to make the survey more intuitive and easier to complete, leading to more robust data collection. This will further improve the accuracy and reliability of the market rate assessment and narrow cost analysis.

There is considerable variability in license types, services provided, providers' rates, and expenditures depending on various provider characteristics. It is recommended that more in-depth statistical modeling techniques be applied to the data acquired from this research. One area in particular is further examination across all indicators based on location. While some analysis was done based on urban versus rural location, additional analysis is recommended.

Ongoing tracking of open positions, and matching families with child care needs with available providers are critical functions of the Child Care Assistance Program. A short and regular provider survey that would only track availability status would provide more accurate and timely data on availability. A secondary benefit would be to shorten the questionnaire considerably by eliminating availability questions from the market rate and narrow cost analysis, which could also improve response rates and reduce survey attrition.

Appendix C: Bright & Early North Dakota

As outlined on the North Dakota Department of Health and Human Services website⁹, Bright & Early North Dakota is the state's Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS), through which providers can access financial incentives, targeted technical assistance, and specialized training opportunities. It contains four steps as outlined below:

Step 1

Quality Rated programs are meeting and maintaining child care licensing regulations, this is the foundation of Bright & Early ND. Licensed early childhood programs are required to maintain at least minimum standards related to; physical space, safety features, cleanliness, staff qualifications and staff-to-child ratios. Children need to be healthy and feel safe to learn and grow. It is the first step in preparing children to be ready for school, work, and life.

Step 2

Quality Rated programs are on the path to continuous quality improvement. They continue to meet the requirements of Step 1 and provide a safe, responsive, and engaging environment that sets the stage for optimal early childhood experiences. An intentionally designed environment allows opportunities for children to experiment, practice their skills, analyze, socialize and problem solve. When the environment supports children's learning and development, they are better prepared for school, work, and life.

Step 3

Quality Rated programs continue to meet the requirements of Steps 1 and 2 and provide meaningful activities and experiences that build upon children's strengths and development. Using a curriculum to plan activities and guide teaching practices which align to the North Dakota Early Standards. In addition, they conduct observation-based assessments to ensure children are making progress toward the goals outlined in their curriculum. When children have meaningful experiences, they are better prepared for school, work, and life.

Step 4

Quality Rated programs continue to meet the requirements of Steps 1-3 and foster relationships that support and emphasize children's interests, motivations, and points of view. All children benefit from being in warm, supportive environments where they can take risks, learn new things, and develop strong relationships with their caregivers and peers. When children experience high-quality interactions, they are better prepared for school, work, and life.
