

Green: Coal Country Community Healthcare Centers


Orange: Bismarck – UND Center for Family Healthcare Red: Northland Health Centers Blue: Sanford Clinics

- There were 40 case consultations to providers in North Dakota since Oct. 1, 2021. All families are offered care coordination and assistance to fulfill social determinants of health (gas, heating, food assistance, childcare, care referrals and coordination) from Family Voices of North Dakota, a team member of the ND PMHCA program.
- Care coordination efforts resulted in 107 referrals to care providers throughout North Dakota.
- Outreach efforts to clinics included NDPMHCA staff visits to the clinics in the Northwest, Southwest and North Central areas of North Dakota.


ND PMHCA team, in collaboration with the Seattle Children's Partnership Access Line (PAL) created the Primary Care Principles for Child Mental Health.



Overview


Unrecognized and untreated child traumatic stress can lead to the development of trauma-related symptoms. These symptoms can persist and worsen over time, making it critical to identify them early. Trauma screening in child service systems, such as child welfare and juvenile justice (SAMSHA, 2014), is one way to identify children and adolescents with trauma symptoms and improve access to evidence-based treatments. Trauma screening by frontline workers helps identify youth who need further assessment and possible intervention, inform service planning, create structure to discuss a child's welfare, and sustain trauma informed systems (Lang, et al., 2017).

There are 142 medical centers in North Dakota and 739 schools

- Many communities have schools but do not have a medical clinic
- Providing health care to kids in schools helps to increase health equity
- Presented to the North Dakota School Counselors regarding universal school screeners as a national guideline and best practice per the National Department of Public Instruction.

Who We Are


The North Dakota Full-Service Community Schools (FSCS) is comprised of partners across various sectors who share the mission of supporting schools, students and families across the state.

What Is A Full-Service Community School?

Full-Service Community Schools are both a place and set of partnerships that serve as a hub to a neighborhood or community. Full-Service Community Schools partner with other organizations to provide a coordinated and integrated set of comprehensive supports.

Why Is The Full-Service Community School Model Important?

Not all students come to school ready to learn. Challenges such as hunger, behavioral health, access to early childhood education, and family engagement can be barriers to student success. Additionally, not all schools have the resources to provide for students and family needs. The FSCS model promotes partner collaboration, so schools
